...it starts with an idea



- Every grant application is about giving a clear picture of what you want to achieve to the organization that is willing to fund the project.
- How to do this?
- Don'ts:
 - Too much attention defining the problem
 - Vague solutions
 - No clear results

Logical Framework Approach



From problem definition to activities

Step 1: Global Objective

Step 2: Specific Objective

Step 3: Results

Step 4: Activities

Step 5: Calculate!

Use the LFA as basis for steering group meetings and compass for your project

Global Objective (why)



Your project contributes to achieving the global objective and should be in line with EU policy

For instance:

Low re-conviction rate

improve road safety

Make sure that you use definitions that are used by EU policy makers as well

Specific Objective (what)



A clear, possibly quantifiable goal of your project.

For example:

5% decrease in re-convictions

Considerable lower number of complaints

Harmonized crime statistic definitions

Results (output) (how)



- Clear verifiable results (output)
- Quantifiable results
- Sustainability ensured
- Risk management
- Divided into activities

Activities



- Every result is divided in activities
- Result 1, activity 1.1
- Do not forget to include actions!
- What, who, when, how and where?
